Start asking yourself these questions and see how your story starts to unfold. Finding the Story Premise:

What is the situation....Who is the main character...What is the goal....Who is the opponent....What is the conflict.... The disaster, climax.... and the resolution....?

What is your story's genre? (For example: science fiction, fantasy, romance, suspense, literary fiction)

Your protagonist:

1. Who is your main character?
2. What is your protagonist's main goal in the story?

Story stakes:

1. What will your protagonist gain if s/he succeeds in reaching the goal?
2. What will s/he lose if s/he fails?

## Obstacles:

1. What are some possible problems that the protagonist must overcome in order to reach the goal?

## Setting:

1. What is the location and time period of your story?

## Your antagonist:

1. Who is in your protagonist's way?

Antagonist's goal: In most cases, the antagonist will have a goal that's incompatible with the protagonist's. Only one of them can succeed.

1. Antagonist's motives (What are the story stakes for your antagonist? Why is his/her goal important to him/her?):

Your protagonist's friend/ally/helper: Who could help your protagonist reach his/her goal?

## Premise: Summary of your story:

Your story is about a character (the protagonist) who wants (an important goal) who is motivated by (why), but encounters conflict (the antagonist) which is preventing or obstructing the goal.
